

COMMUNITY SCHOOL PILLARS AT A GLANCE

Racine community schools use four pillars to guide their goals and work. The pillars are integrated student support, expanded and enriched time and opportunities, active family and community engagement and collaborative leadership.

Integrative Student Supports: Community schools are supporting the whole student by offering services that meet physical, emotional and social needs. In Racine, services are offered through partnerships with organizations that provide mental health counseling, food drives, community nights and more.

Expanded and Enriched Learning Time and Opportunity: A fancy way of saying that community schools offer learning opportunities outside of the classroom and normal school hours. Students are encouraged to participate in extended learning (on-site after school programming) and off-site programming, such as Juntos, a program that teaches the whole family about college readiness, which has traditionally been hosted in the community.

Active Family and Community Engagement: Community schools want to have family members of students and community members be part of the school family. They are invited to help plan events, volunteer and serve on leadership teams.

Collaborative Leadership: Community schools value the voice of all stakeholders (students, parents, teachers, community members and others). Each community school has different opportunities for stakeholders to be part of the decision-making process such as parent groups, leadership teams and various committees.



COMMUNITY NIGHTS

Community Nights are monthly events hosted at community schools that meet all four of the pillars at once:

- Community partners are present to offer resources to families.
- Community nights are after school and have an educational focus.
- Families and community members are invited to attend or even volunteer to help plan or run.
- Community nights are planned with students, parents, staff and partners.

Above is a picture from a Black History Month community night at Mitchell in 2023. At this event, students performed step, dance and drumming. Attendees learned about gradients of color, played math games popular in Black culture and learned about important people in Black History from projects students created.

KNAPP

In our September benchmark for literacy, we saw significant progress among our K-3 students. Kindergarten achieved a proficiency rate of 56%, while 1st grade reached 34%, and 2nd grade achieved 37%. Our goal is to raise the proficiency rate to 55% for all three grade levels. Let's keep up the great work!



JULIAN THOMAS

Julian Thomas' goal for the second quarter is to continue to increase academic achievement by continuing professional learning and coaching for all staff members. By using the Plan-Do-Study/Check-Act (PDS/CA) model, staff will be able to use what they've learned from their own training to help students succeed.



THE ACADEMIES OF RACINE AT MITCHELL COMMUNITY SCHOOL

In the month of October, students in grades 4-8 started their journey in reaching our multiplication fluency goal of 75% of our students knowing all multiplication facts from 0-12. One of their centers for math is multiplication-centered.

The first quarter of school has flown by! The Mitchell community did a lot of great things and there are more amazing opportunities on the horizon.



Mental Health Moment: Help Your Child Talk About Their Mental Health

How Do I Know If My Child/Teen Has Depression?

Depression in children and teens can be a serious issue. According to Mental Health America, 16% of youths (ages 12-18) reported experiencing at least one episode of depression over the last year. Depression is one of the most common mental health issues in the United States. Depression is a mood disorder that causes sadness which can be present every day for 2 or more weeks. Children and teens may have difficult talking about or describing how they feel. They may also try to hide how they are feeling because they don't want to bother or upset you. However, there are common symptoms that you may notice in your child that can help you start a conversation with them about how they are feeling. Here are some common symptoms that your child may be experiencing when they are having an issue with depression.

The most common symptoms of depression are:

- They seem sad and irritable, and this has been present for at least 2 weeks.
- · Loss of enjoyment in activities that used to make them happy.

Other signs of depression you may notice:

- · Struggling with schoolwork
- · Spending more time alone and less time with friends
- · Having a difficult time focusing
- Appearing to have less energy or motivation to complete simple tasks
- · Cries more easily and expresses more guilt or worthlessness
- Change in sleep patterns (trouble sleeping or tired all day)
- Changes in eating patterns (eating too much or too little)
- · Showing self-injury or self-destructive behaviors

Teens may also experience these symptoms:

- · Hopeless about their future
- Lacking interest in personal hygiene
- · Engaging in substance use

Depression is treatable and the key is to notice symptoms early. If you have noticed some of these symptoms in your child that are lasting more than two weeks, the next step is to ask them about how they are feeling.

Some simple conversation starts about mental health are:

- "How are you feeling?"
- "I've noticed you've been down lately, what's going on?"
- "Seems like you haven't been yourself lately."

It is very important to talk openly with your child about how they have been feeling. Encourage them to share their feelings with you. Asking a direct question is the best way for your child to open up about their feelings.

One tip for you as a parent is to listen without judgement to the concerns that your child is expressing to you. Don't minimize the feelings that your child is sharing with you.

What can I do if my child or teen seems depressed?

- If your child or teen report symptoms lasting more than 2 weeks, consult your child's doctor for and evaluation to determine if further treatment may be necessary.
- Another helping professional is your child's School Social Worker and Counselor. They can help with additional support and resources that are available in our community.
- Educate yourself about depression and community resources including mental health professionals that can help by visiting the Racine County Family Resource website at www.RacineCountyFamilyResources.com.
