



In March 2020, as the COVID-19 pandemic reached Racine County, <u>United Way and the Racine Community Foundation partnered to provide aid to local nonprofits</u>. Community Cares offered support in two ways: financial support in the form of emergency grants and coordinated supply drives directly related to agency needs.

Community Cares COVID-19 Relief Fund

United Way of Racine County and the Racine Community Foundation launched the fund by contributing a combined \$35,000. United Way covered the administrative costs associated with processing donations and allocating grants. Between March and August 2020, a total of \$149,189.87 was contributed to the fund by 245 individuals and organizations. A full list of donors can be found at the end of this report.

Racine County COVID-19 Relief Fund grants ranged from \$1,000-5,000 and were available to 501(c)(3) organizations that were currently funded by either United Way of Racine County or the Racine Community Foundation. Applicants submitted a brief online application, and proposals were reviewed by a committee comprised of United Way and Racine Community Foundation staff and board members. The fund accepted donations through August 31, 2020, and the final grants were awarded in September 2020.

Twenty-seven organizations received 37 grants totaling \$148,395. These are the organizations that received funding and how that funding was invested. Missing summaries will continue to be updated as grantees complete use of the funds.

assistance, food, cleaning supplies and PPE. In late June/July, the most prevalent needs were rental assistance and child care. Funding provided 15,000 meals to Racine County residents in need. Great Lakes Community Conservation Corps Great Lakes Community Conservation Corps Funding supported travel expenses incurred by Great Lakes CCC members who served at food pantries in response to displaced volunteers for over 12 weeks. Funding provided protective items at HALO, including PPE, thermometers and plexiglass barriers, and food and cleaning supplies for clients in hotels and the housing program. Funding supported a collaboration with Ascension All Saints' Specialty Care Clinic to provide a safe space for delivering healthcare to high-risk allergy, asthma and immunology patients. Funding provided to-go meal supplies, including containers, disposable cups with lids and carry out bags, allowing the Hospitality Center, Inc. Funding provided tho-go meal supplies, including containers, disposable cups with lids and carry out bags, allowing the Hospitality Center to safely provide meals to clients in a grab-and-go format. Funding provided phone, computer, IT services and other supplies needed in order to continue serving clients during the pandemic. Funding supported the additional staffing needed to respond to a pandemic-related influx of 2-1-1 callers and ensure that the resources and services provided to callers were accurate. Funding supported the creation of a 24/7 support hotline, transition from in-person to virtual support groups and SafeZone Training. Funding supported the creation of supply boxes distributed to 1,000 low-income families impacted by COVID-19. The boxes contained toilet paper, paper towels, dish soap, face masks, hand sanitizer and food. Racine County Food Bank Funding supported the creation of emergency family food boxes. Funding supported the development, management and administration of the Healthy Living Kitchen and free meal programs, which provided nutritious meals to senio

COVID-19 Supply Drive

In addition to collecting and disbursing funds, United Way of Racine County facilitated connecting donated supplies to organizations that needed them. Racine County nonprofits were invited to submit supply needs and delivery instructions, and United Way shared those needs via multiple communication channels. The lists were updated weekly, ensuring that community members were able to respond to organizations' most emergent needs. Between March and August, 9 organizations listed supply needs on the Community Cares page.
