At that meeting, we painted the 4-H emblem on the back of gloves with puffy paint. The sewing project members sewed the 4-H emblem on the sweatshirts.

Everyone helped out by putting the sweatshirts in the bags, writing their sizes on the bottom, and putting in gloves. The last step was to attach the clothespin to the bag and carry them out to the car.













